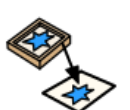

Science

Animals come in all shapes, sizes and colours! They have different features such as wings, beaks, feathers, fur, scales, antennae and horns.

Classifying and sorting are key enquiry skills that allow us as scientists to organise animals in different ways. Some are similar, like those that walk on two legs or four. Others are different, such as those that lay eggs or have live young.

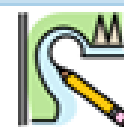

Design & Technology

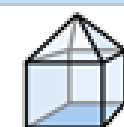
In the woods, animal **structures** are found in places such as trees, leaf litter and underground. Let's explore the academy grounds, looking at wildlife and the dens or nests that they build. Layering natural materials such as moss and twigs, 3D shapes can be built such as a **bug hotel** or a **nest**. Joining materials can be tied or attached securely to make them stronger.

Through traditional tales such as *Hansel and Gretel* and well-loved stories like *The Gruffalo*, children can identify the sequence of events within a story by recognising the beginning, middle, and end. This is known as the story structure. Characters' appearances and personalities can be described using adjectives and noun phrases. These stories often explore themes such as bravery, problem-solving, and quick thinking.



Phonics



Words are made of different sounds and these can be written in several ways.



For example, *ai* in *snail* and *ay* in *play*. Split vowel digraphs are two letters that are separated by the final sound, such as *a_e* in *wave* and *i_e* in *slide*. Blending these sounds together creates words— *r - a - i - n = rain*.

Maths

Numbers up to 100 are made of tens and ones: the place value of 2-digit numbers. They can be manipulated in different ways including portioning, combining tens and ones and showing in different representations.

$$26 = 20 + 6$$

$$40 + 7 = 47$$

2 tens and 6 ones

4 tens and 7 ones

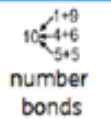

These numbers, are added together to make a larger value. Pairs of numbers can have the same total e.g. 10 or 20— these are called number bonds. Subtraction is used if part of the whole number is removed or a number is less.

$$2 + 8 = 10$$

$$7 + 3 = 10$$

$$34 + 9 = 43$$

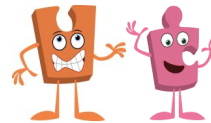

When measuring lengths, the larger a number's value has the longer the object must be. If it is a smaller value, the item is shorter .

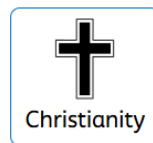
